Dear Sir:

I write to express my shock and surprise at comments by Al Shea in the August 11 edition of *Gambit*. His cavalier dismissal of the play *As Is*, which the CAC has selected to open its fall season, exhibits a stunning lack of judgment and taste.

How can he refer to a play that

deals with the most important social and medical issue of the day with compassion, wisdom, and sensitivity as "now passee"? The AIDS epidemic shows no signs of going away. Only a Pollyanna of the most limited mentality or the most heartless misanthrope would suggest that our theatres should be producing a "riotous comedy" instead of "another dreary look at AIDS." Such cynicism and moral blindness is especially revolting in a column about the arts, since so many in the artistic community have been victims of this terrible disease.

And what does Mr. Shea propose as an alternative to *As Is*? *House of Blue Leaves* is a good play, and yes it could be another commercial tie-in with the Papal visit (much like the Popeyes Fried Chicken billboards that proclaim "Love That City"). But I expect there might be several people in this largely Roman Catholic city who would be offended by a comedy about an attempted assassination of the Pope during a visit to America.

Mr. Shea clearly did not have his typewriter on his brain in the same room when he wrote that column.

MARCH ON WASHINGTON JOINT PROJECT BEING HELD

The March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights and the National Association of People with AIDS (NAPWA) are proud to announce co-sponsorship of "A Time to Shine", a project designed to bring People with AIDS (PWAs) to the March scheduled for October 11, 1987. Community leaders in the fight against AIDS have joined with March and NAPWA organizers to ask supporters from coast to coast to participate in giving house parties to raise funds for this cause.

"A Time to Shine" was proposed by Los Angeles AIDS activist Matt Redman who believes it is critical that PWAs attend the March in large numbers. Redman maintains that "it is essential that the government know that PWAs will not simply quietly die while the government's response to this epidemic remains totally inadequate due to fear and bigotry directed toward gay men." Redman will serve as Fundraising Coordinator and will raise money to fund a national lottery which will be used for PWA transportation, housing and meals. The lottery is structured to ensure that PWAs will come to the March from everywhere across the country and will include people of color and women. PWAs will form the lead contingent of the March.

David Almand, a PWA on the Executive Committee for the March and a member of NAPWA is the Project Administrator for "A Time to Shine" and will be based in Washington. He is working on coordinating logistics for the event which include arrangements for housing, transportation, a buddy system and medical care for participants.

Almand sees the project as a critical method of educating legislators. "A few key legislators know what's going on," says Almand, "but the background of many is dangerously inadequate." He recounts one incident during a visit NAPWA and the AIDS Action Council organized with

four U.S. Senators. "One tried to excuse himself from AIDS because he thought it was 40 PWAs in his state. It was a PWA health care worker's suggestion to inform him that he personally cared for over 80 that state." Almand emphasized "all the work of high-powered people don't have the same words from a PWA."

Party plans are already in Southern California, San Francisco, Baltimore, New York where. A commitment from the Mission, KS is an indication of broad geographic support for the project.

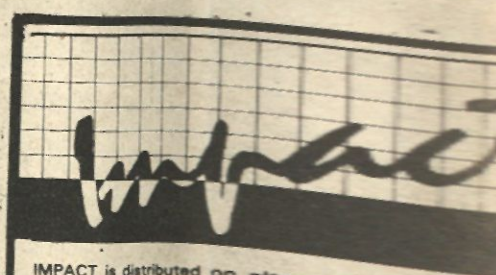

NEW AIDS TREATMENT BEINGS CLINICAL TRIALS IN LONDON, NEW YORK CITY

The beginning of a clinical trials of a new therapeutic approach for the treatment of patients with Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) in the United States and England was announced by Medicorp, Inc., a Canadian-based biomedical company which manufactures the treatment.

The pilot program will take place in St. Stephens and Westminster Hospitals in London, and the Bronx Veterans Administration Hospital in New York. The Research and Development Committee and Human Studies Sub-committee of the Bronx V.A. Hospital and the Ethical Review Committees of the London hospitals have reviewed and approved the clinical protocols at each institution.

"A very small trial at Addenbrooke's Hospital of Cambridge University was sufficiently encouraging to initiate the expanded trials, which we anticipate will confirm the preliminary results," says Medicorp Senior Vice President Jack Snyder. "The larger-scale London and New York trials, which include approximately 70 patients and controls, will help us determine its efficacy."

The technique being used was first developed by Dr. Abraham Karpas, Assistant Director of Research of the Department of Hematological Medicine at Cambridge University in England and has been exclusively licensed to Medicorp, Inc.

Briefly, the process uses plasma collected from healthy volunteers

who test positive for a particular type of antibody. The donated plasma are then processed and administered to patients who are afflicted with AIDS.

"The therapeutic approach is known as passive immunotherapy," says treatment developer Dr. Abraham Karpas. "In the initial trial, there was no side effect attributable to the treatment. Although there was insufficient data for statistical analysis, there was considerable subjective improvement in the patients noted by both the medical and nursing staff."

Medicorp has expanded the clinical study of the therapy in order to further analyze it. "Although it is estimated the trial will last at least 12 months, we will be monitoring participants closely to detect any trends that might appear between the treatment and control groups prior to that time," concludes Karpas.

Medicorp, Inc. is a privately held, Montreal-based biomedical company with research efforts in the areas of AIDS therapeutics and diagnostics, cancer diagnostics, transplantation diagnostics and immunotherapy and general reagents for immunodiagnostics. Medicorp also distributes and markets diagnostic products in Canada and Latin America, including a rapid AIDS test developed by Karpas.

TRANSVESTITE CONTACT SERVICE SPONSOR MISS GAY NORTH AMERICA

Philip Salme, the national executive director of the North American Transvestite-Transsexual Contact Service announces that 100 of the most beautiful transvestites and transsexuals will participate in Miss Gay North America which will be held April 1, 1988 in Vancouver, Canada. Ina Rubin, the national coordinator reported that a grant from the Transworld Foundation in Los Angeles has made the idea become a reality. The NATCS sponsored the MISS HUNG American contest in

1983 with the help of the gay press. The event was held in Hollywood and the contestants were dressed as females but had to expose their genitalia. According to Rubin, it was pretty overwhelming for many transvestite and transsexuals. Only 14 contestants from throughout the United States attended although over

2,000 individuals attend the event. Salem feels that if word of mouth spread, the Transworld Foundation will charter a bus from 3 different locations. Eastern entrants will depart Boston with pick-ups in New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Columbus, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Chicago, Milwaukee, and Minneapolis. Southern entrants will depart from Raleigh with pick-ups in Atlanta, Mobile, and New Orleans. Southwestern entrants will depart from Houston with pickups in Dallas, Oklahoma City, and Denver. West Coast entrants will depart from San Diego and make stops all at West Coast cities. Photographs should be included with a biography.

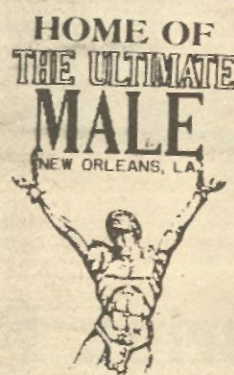

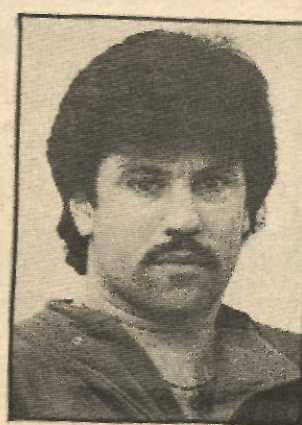

CREATIVE ACTION AGAINST AIDS

Virtually anyone, whatever their skills or available time, can do something to help in the fight against AIDS.

That's the premise of a new booklet, being prepared as a non-profit, cooperative effort by a number of publishers and writers. The booklet, titled *You Can Do Something About Aids*, will be widely distributed next spring, free of charge.

"I think huge numbers of people in middle America, including many who a few years ago didn't know what AIDS was, are now eager to do something about it," says Sasha Alyson. His company, Alyson Publications, is coordinating the all-volunteer effort.

"Unfortunately, most of those people assume there's nothing they

can do. The point of this booklet is to give them some ideas, to get them started, to encourage them to think creatively about the options open to them."

Some of those ideas will be relatively obvious: write to your elected representatives, for example. Others will be less obvious: volunteer your specific skills to help a local AIDS group; or find ways to combat AIDS within the context of your profession.

"The booklet will emphasize the wide range of ways that people can help fight AIDS," Alyson explains. "We've got a lot of ideas already, but we need more. We want to be creative in exploring the many steps, big and small, that individuals around the country can take." 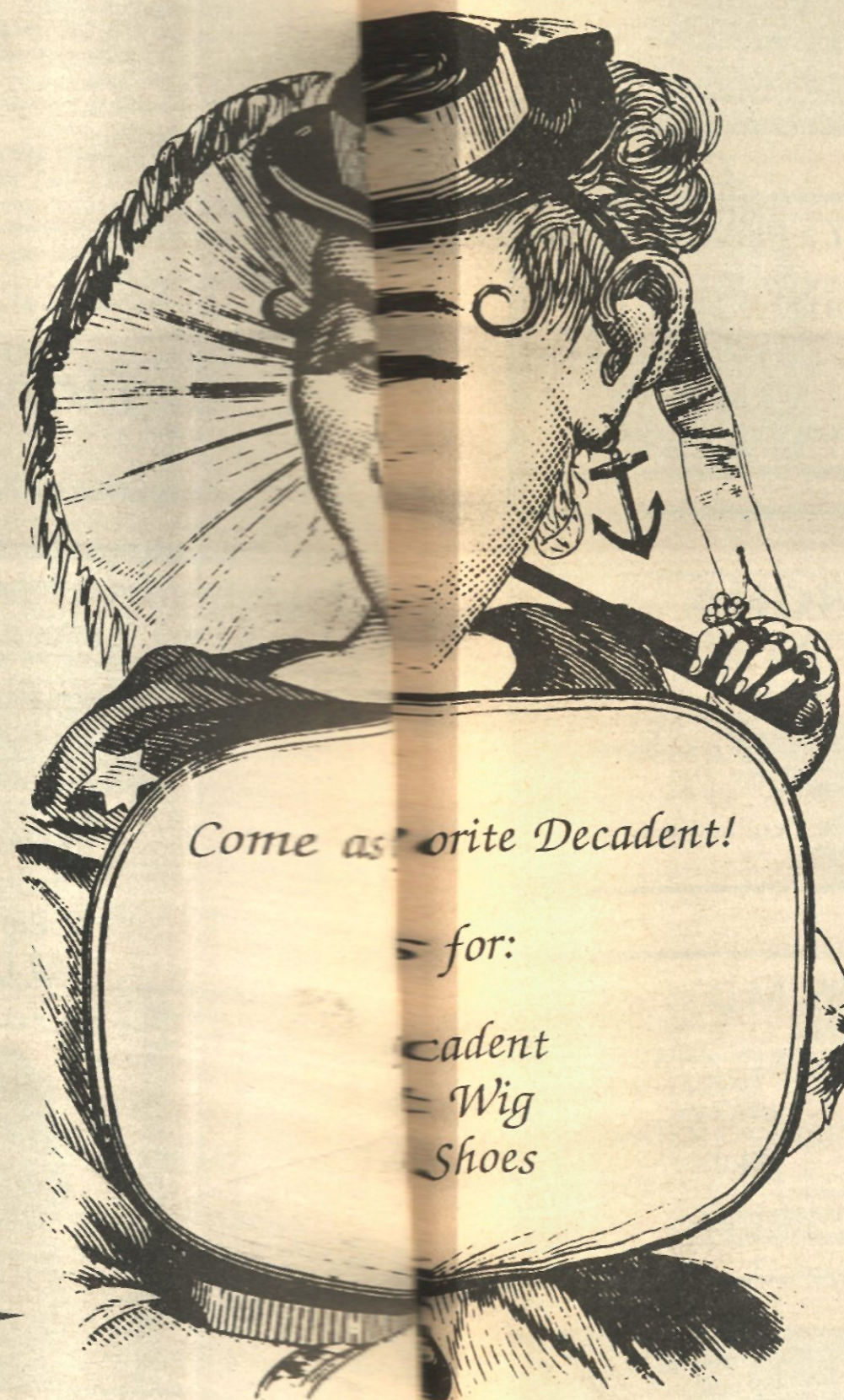

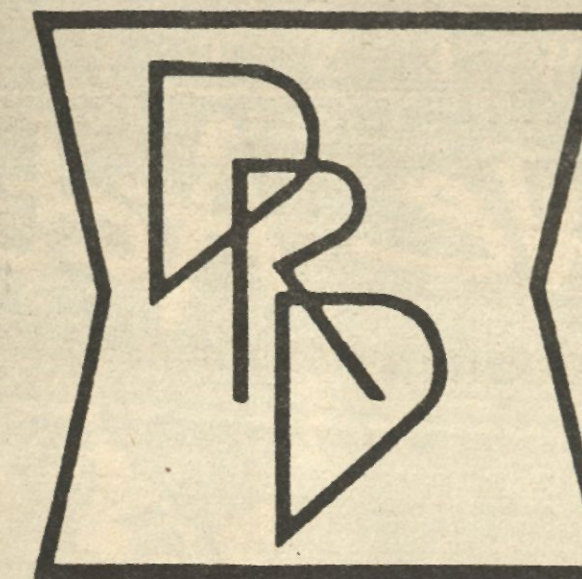

The Party's Just Beginning

Life Upon The Wicked Stage

by Ed Real

The 1986-87 theatrical season finally gasped its way to a close with Southern Rep's version of Shakespeare's *As You Like It*, loosely based on New Orleans in 1870, a production that arrived just in time for this column's annual dubious achievement awards. This *As You Like It* had as little to do with this city in that era as it did with Shakespeare. Now I have no objection to putting Shakespeare's works into any setting if there is a point to be made; for the past few seasons some of the best local productions have been Buzz Podewell's revisionist Shakespeare stagings which have been adapted to express contemporary themes such as brainwashing (*Taming of the Shrew*), problems of race (*Twelfth Night*), and urban teen suicide (*Romeo and Juliet*). Southern Rep's decision to do a biracial 1870 version of this comedy has no such point. As far as I can see, the change of setting

must have had to do either with the availability of costumes or with political grantsmanship.

There was simply no sense at all in the way this production was put together. If the producers wanted to make such a point about the specific setting, why didn't they stick to it, instead of turning the show into an anachronistic gumbo? Director Henry Hoffman stated in a program note: "We started out trying to be real authentic, but then decided to go with what works." Well, the elements he has chosen may have worked individually in other contexts, but here they were a meaningless jumble.

As the show began, a Mardi Gras figure led in an assembly of merry-makers who watched a poorly danced piece of turpsy chore by a pair of Commedia figures. Some members of the cast carried the state flag which was adopted in 1911, some sang a Hank Williams song dating from the

1940's, and others in a display of bad taste that was enough to induce mass wretching, sang the trite "Let there be Peace on Earth, and Let It Begin With Me." I'm not kidding!

Roles were assigned without regard to race (thus a lifelong servant was played by a white, and members of the same family could be black or white). Accents varied from broad southern to cajun to attempts at "Shakespearean" to Jacques' emphatic German or Jewiws (I couldn't tell what it was supposed to be). Acting styles were as diverse as the accents. All of this mess was played out before a backdrop of red, black and white that looked suspiciously like the handiwork of Albert Speer.

Originally I would attempt to warn readers to save their money, but alas it is too late: the public schools and the state have already flushed some public funds down this theatrical toilet.

For this attack on our sensibilities and on Shakespeare himself, we announce our first dubious achievement award of the season—The Nelson Camp Memorial Pretentious Trash Award. Hail to thee, Henry Hoffman; Brad this never wert.

Other winners in this year's Hall of Infamy are as follows:

The Gertrude Stein Award for namedropping in programs goes to Christopher Blake.

The Phyllis Stein award for criticism is presented to Al Shea of *Gambit*, for suggesting that the New Orleans Symphony drop Mahler because he's "unmelodic," and for say-

ing that As Is is "passee" and "an other dreary look at AIDS".

The Flea Market Tuxedo is awarded to Al Shea for twice using his valuable column space to sneer at what other critics wear.

The Ina Ray Hutton Platinum Baton goes to Carl Walker and his all-girl shows.

The Mike Early Certificate of Attendance is presented to the performer who decides it is better to stay away and do nothing than to show up and do something bad. This year's winner is Gabe Kaplan who missed all performances of *Doubles* at the Saenger. Lucky Gabe.

The Sly Stallone Double Three Citationis for those whose acting is as bad as their writing. Winners in two categories are Anthony Newley (Professional) and Ken Mentel (rank amateur).

The Rape of a Classic Award is a tie between Le Petit's *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* and Southern Rep's *As You Like It*.

Cooldest Costume Prize goes to Jensin in *Life Class*; here's somebody who knows who to dress for the CAC.

The Peggy Castle Lifetime Achievement Plaque is presented to David Cuthbert, who remembers every B-movie ever made, and shares them with us in musicals.

The Inverse Ecology Citation goes to Theatre Marigny. By staging Chris Blake's old plays they proved it's possible to pollute the atmosphere by recycling toxic waste.

The Best Dead Horses Don't They

Award is presented to Le Petit for its upcoming season: four of the six plays have appeared on other stages in the city in the last five years.

The Thelma Toole Prize for absurd hand gestures is awarded to the Saenger's *ound of Music*. Everytime the nuns sang "How do you hold a moonbeam in your hand" they seemed to be fondling an udder.

Double Your Pleasure Award: UNO and Bayou Dinner Theatre share a pack of Doublemint of scheduling *Black Comedy* simultaneously.

Worst tile for a musical: Le Veau Qui Tete.

Worst idea for a musical: Le Veau Qui Tete.

Worst directing of a musical: Le Veau Qui Tete. When they say blocking, Pam, they don't mean putting the band in front of the performers.

Best excuse for revoking the Tony Award for Best Play: *Biloxi Blues*, Neil Simon's commercial ripoff which won over *As Is* and Ma Rainey's *Black Bottom*.

Most misnamed theatrical event of the year: the First Annual Tennessee Williams Festival, which followed Marigny's *Williams Fest* by three years.

Lest we forget the very real accomplishments of the season, it is appropriate that we also recognize the best of the year in this space.

While it was not a great year for women's roles, there was exceptional work turned in by the entire case of *Where The Girls Were*, Stacy Arton in *Nuts*, Blair Ziegler and Ricky Graham in *Greater Tuna*, Mim Babin in *Brighton Beach* and Kaz Akers in *Forbidden Broadway*. But top honors must go to Janet Shea, who walked off with all the other good

roles (*Jacques and His Master*, *Hay Fever*, *Follies* and *It's Only a Play*). Could there be a Sweeney Todd in her future?

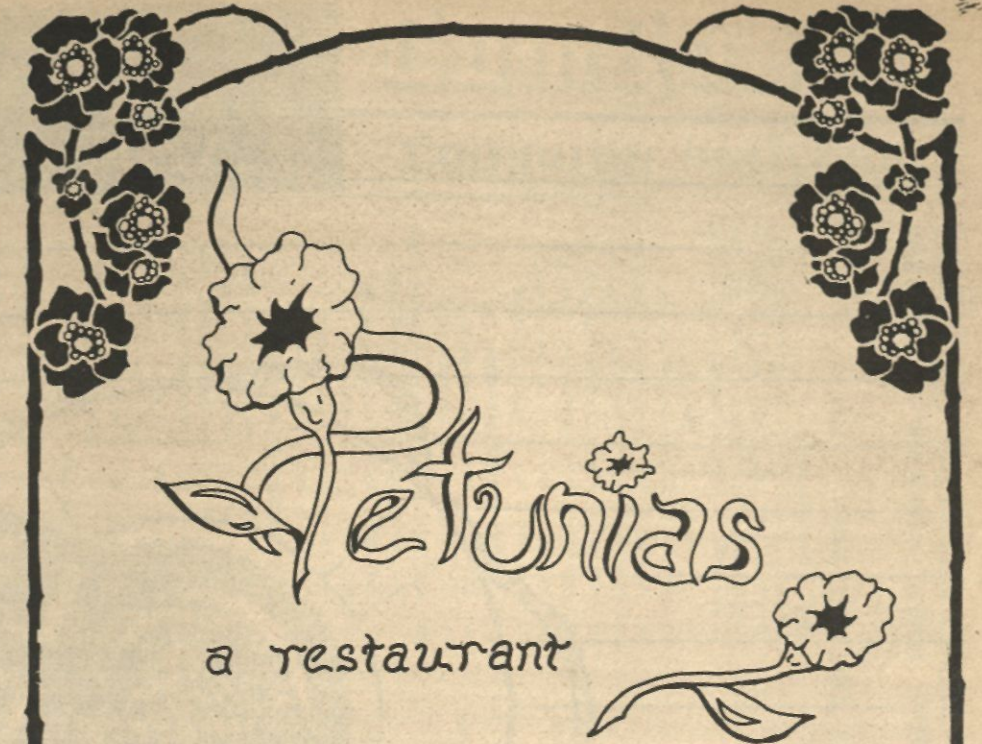
Distinguished male performances came from Blair Ziegler (*The Dresser*), Audley Keck (*Dresser and Loot*), Douglas Leal (*Brighton Beach*). Again, one performer dominates the field: Mark McLaughlin in *Jacques and His Master*, *Loot*, *A Perfect Party* plus a couple of lesser roles.

Director of the year was obviously Carl Walker who guided three productions into my top ten list, and the best locally produced shows in my opinion were:

1. *Where The Girls Were* (CAC).
2. *Greater Tuna* (CAC).
3. *The Taming of the Shrew* (Tulane Theatre Dept.).
4. *The Dresser* (Le Petit).
5. *Jacques and His Masters* (CAC).
6. *Follies in Concert* (Tulane Music Dept.).
7. *Loot* (Tulane Center Stage).
8. *Forbidden Broadway* (Moonbabs).
9. *Gertrude Stein and a Companion* (Marigny).
10. *Brighton Beach Memoirs* (Le Petit).

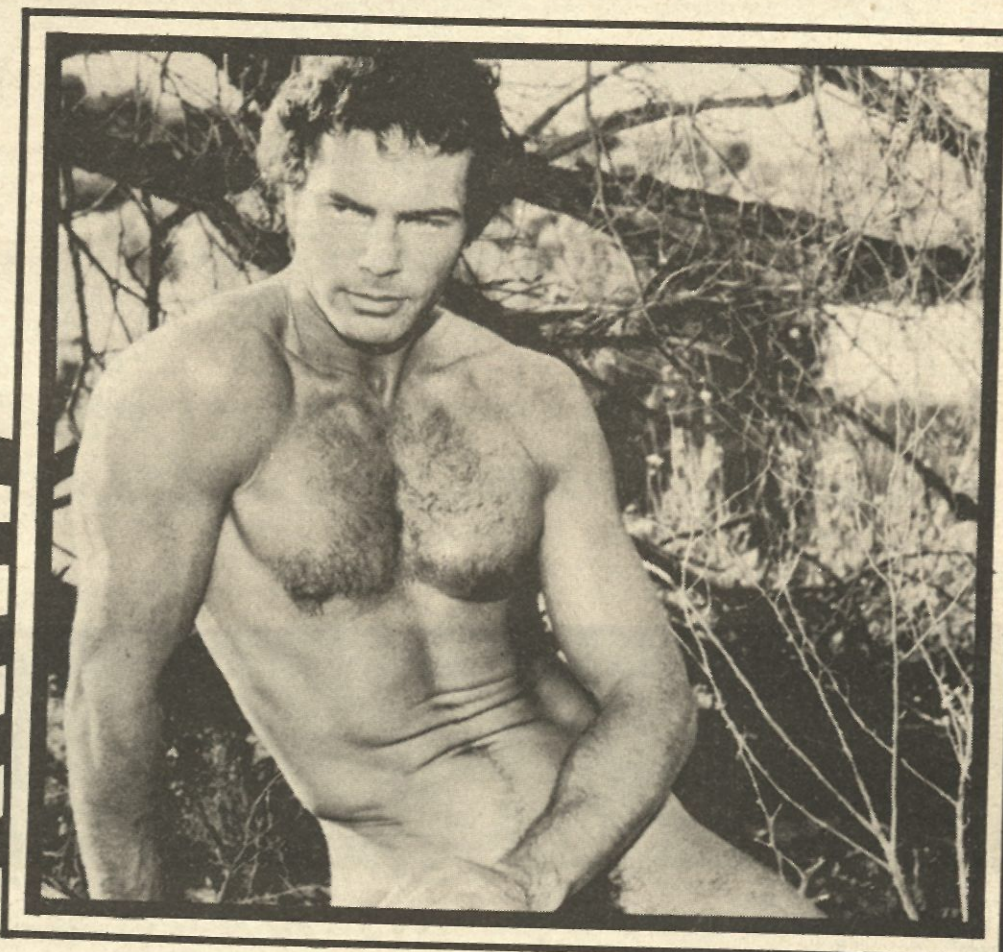
